The 2022-2023 fiscal year marked a return to *The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act* revenue sharing formula for the CIF, which determines our annual revenues as a portion of the net revenues generated by Casinos Regina and Moose Jaw. We are grateful for the emergency response grants provided by the Government of Saskatchewan in 2020-2021 and 2021-2022 that allowed us to continue to offer our grant programs. Looking forward, we are optimistic that our capacity to support community-based programs will stabilize at levels closer to those seen prior to March 2020.

The CIF supports a wide range of organizations, programs, people and communities in all regions of the province through our Community Grant and Summer Grant programs. Funded programs benefit approximately 20% of the province's population, with children and youth being the primary beneficiaries. Almost half of the regional grants approved were awarded to communities outside of Saskatchewan's 17 cities, reflecting our priority of supporting rural and Northern programming.

Our volunteer peer review committees play a critical role in reviewing Community Grant program applications and providing their recommendations to the CIF Board. Committee members bring a range of community knowledge and experience from their respective regions and sectors, and this expertise is invaluable when assessing applications. Members contribute significant time and energy to the review process, and the CIF Board extends its heartfelt appreciation to all members of our four peer review committees.

We look forward to the coming year and our continued support of programs and services that enhance quality of life in communities across the province.

Our Strategic INITIATIVES

The nonprofit sector in Saskatchewan and across Canada has been significantly impacted by the pandemic, with many organizations experiencing decreased revenues and increased demand for services. Combined with increasing costs, and volunteer and employee recruitment and retention challenges, the capacity of community-based organizations to offer their programs and services may be diminished. Committed to supporting the nonprofit sector and ensuring accessibility to local programs, the CIF Board recommended an increase to the Community Grant Program local maximum grant from \$25,000 to \$30,000 that will come into effect April 1, 2023.

CIF remains a member and host of the Saskatchewan Nonprofit Partnership. In 2022, with the financial support of the Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport, the Partnership undertook a survey in collaboration with Insightrix Research Inc. to understand the impacts of the pandemic on volunteerism in Saskatchewan. Results confirmed that the pandemic and associated health concerns, re-assessing personal and family priorities,

and inflation have effected individual's motivation and ability to volunteer. The survey indicates that while there is still a high level of interest in volunteering, how and what people choose to volunteer for has changed. This may have long-term impacts on community-based organizations, and especially those that rely on volunteers to offer programs and recreation opportunities.

Heritage Saskatchewan and CIF continue to colead SaskWellbeing, an initiative that promotes adoption of a wellbeing lens by all sectors, and encourages multisectoral partnerships to address the complex and interdependent challenges and opportunities in Saskatchewan communities. Thanks to funding through the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC), CIF has partnered with the Johnson Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy (University of Regina), to carry out research that examines the extent to which Saskatchewan municipalities are aware of, and incorporating wellbeing into their policies, planning and budgets. Results of the research will be shared later in 2023 and will inform future priorities for SaskWellbeing.

Opinion

1. Nature of operations:

The Community Initiatives Fund (the "Fund"), previously known as the Associated Entities Fund, was established on August 23, 1996 by *The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act*. It is managed by a Board composed of not more than eight persons appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. The Board is responsible for managing and operating the Fund.

Pursuant to *The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act*, the Government of Saskatchewan receives, into the General Revenue Fund, certain gaming revenues. The Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport transfers a portion of these gaming revenues to the Fund. The Board of the Fund grants these revenues to persons, organizations or associations in Saskatchewan for purposes prescribed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council upon application to and approval by the Board.

The Fund has an agreement with Sask Sport Inc. to provide administrative services to the Fund, which began April 1, 2020 and expired on March 31, 2023. In 2023 Sask Sport Inc. was paid \$194,000 (2022 - \$194,000). A new agreement was signed March 24, 2023 which will begin April 1, 2023 and expire on March 31, 2026.

2. Significant accounting policies:

The Fund uses generally accepted accounting principles as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of CPA Canada. The following accounting policies are considered significant.

Grant expense:

Grants are recognized when a completed grant application is received, all eligibility criteria are met by an eligible organization, and approval is obtained from the Board.

Grant returns:

Grant returns are recognized when a completed follow up report is received indicating funds were not fully utilized and approval is obtained from the Board.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the Public Sector Accounting Standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Differences are reflected in current revenues and expenses when identified.

Revenue recognition:

Transfers from the General Revenue Fund are recognized when received or receivable. Interest revenue is recognized when earned.

Investments:

Fixed income investments are recorded at amortized cost.

3. Designated net assets:

Pursuant to directions given under the governing legislation, the Board of the Fund has designated the net financial assets of \$5,671,558 (2022 - \$4,045,422) as follows:

- **Community Grants** to provide project grants to community initiatives that enhance human development;
- Regional Exhibition Associations to fund the activities of the associations in their communities;

The underlying assets consist of cash and investments. These designated net assets are not available for other purposes without the approval of the Board.

4. Accounts Receivable and Accounts Payable:

Pursuant to an Order in Council, the Fund has recorded funds received from the Minister responsible for First Nations, Metis and Northern Affairs for the purpose of holding casino funds in trust until a Community Development Corporation is established for the Gold Horse Casino. The amount received was\$585,484 (2022 - \$694,186) and is included in accounts payable.

5. Investments:

Investments consist of the following:

6. Financial risk management:

Credit risk:

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The only receivable the Fund has at year end is interest receivable from Guaranteed Investment Certificates which are considered to be low risk.

Currency risk:

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The Fund is not exposed to any currency risk because it deals exclusively in Canadian currency.

Interest rate risk:

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Fund does not borrow any funds and only invests in fixed income instruments with a guaranteed rate of return which carry minimal interest rate risk.

Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Fund receives its funding from the Province of Saskatchewan prior to making grant commitments and maintains sufficient cash to meet current needs, therefore the exposure to liquidity risk is considered to be low.

Price risk:

Price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. The Fund does not invest in any equity instruments and only purchases government guaranteed fixed income instruments or those issued by a major Canadian bank so the price risk is considered to be low.

7. Related party transactions:

These financial statements include transactions with related parties. The Fund is related to all Saskatchewan Crown agencies such as ministries, corporations, boards and commissions under the common control of the Government of Saskatchewan. Also, the Fund is related to non-Crown enterprises that the Government jointly controls.

Related parties also include key management personnel which include Board members and the Executive Director of the Fund. All transactions with key management personnel were payments routinely paid in exchange for services rendered.

March 31, 2023

These related party transactions are in the normal course of operations and are recorded at the exchange amount which is the amount of consideration established and agreed to by the related parties. Other related party transactions and amounts due to/from are disclosed separately in these financial statements.

8. Budget:

The original budget was approved by the Board of Trustees on March 25, 2022.

9. Financial instruments:

The Fund, as part of its operations, carries a number of financial instruments which include cash, interest receivable, investments, accounts payable and grants payable. All financial instruments are carried at amortized costs which approximates their fair value due to their relative short term maturities.

10. Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses:

A statement of remeasurement gains and losses has not been presented in these financial statements because all financial instruments are measured at amortized cost.

11. Lease and contract commitments:

The Fund is committed to an office lease, administrative service contract and software support contracts requiring minimum payments over the next three years as follows:

The Fund is also committed to paying actual general occupancy costs including property tax and operating expenses. These costs are not included in the lease and contract payment amounts noted above. These costs are anticipated to be \$19,031 in 2024.

12. Statement of Changes in Net Assets:

A Statement of Changes in Net Assets has not been prepared as the information is readily apparent from the other financial statements.
