The Community Initiatives Fund's work and support reaches lands covered by Treaties 2, 4, 5, 6, 8, and 10, the traditional lands of the Cree (Nêhiyawak; Nêhithawak; Nêhinawak), Dakota and Lakota (Sioux), Dene (Chipewyan), Nakota (Assiniboine), and Saulteaux (Nahkawininiwak) peoples, as well as homeland of the Métis.

Message from the CHAIR & EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

The CIF supports a wide range of organizations, programs, people and communities in all regions of the province through our Community Grant and Summer Grant programs. In 2025/2026 the CIF approved \$11,141,150 in support of 658 programs, an increase of 32% and 10% respectively over the previous year. Since our establishment in 1996, we have approved a total of more than \$230 million to support community-based programs and initiatives.

Partnerships are critical to our work and this year we were excited to enter into a new partnership with Scale Enterprises and the Saskatoon Community Foundation to support Saskatchewan nonprofits' participation in the Thriving Nonprofits Program. To date CIF has provided funding to support 34 organizations to participate in two program cohorts, with a commitment to support participation in an additional three cohorts over the next two years. Through our SaskWellbeing partnership with Heritage Saskatchewan we received and disseminated updated Saskatchewan Index of Wellbeing data that indicates trends in wellbeing across eight domains. And as a member of the Saskatchewan Nonprofit Partnership CIF supported a second survey of the Saskatchewan nonprofit sector undertaken by Insightrix Research as well as organizational development work.

Our volunteer peer review committees play a critical role in reviewing Community Grant program applications and providing their recommendations to the CIF Board. Committee members bring a range of community knowledge and experience from their respective regions and sectors, and this expertise is invaluable when assessing applications. Members contribute significant time and energy to the review process, and the CIF Board extends its heartfelt appreciation to all members of our four peer review committees.

CIF experienced a few transitions this year as the terms of four Board members came to an end and we welcomed four new Board members in August. The year also saw the departure of our long-time Grants Coordinator Rhonda Newton. We extend our sincere gratitude and appreciation to these individuals for their contributions to the CIF.

We look forward to the coming year and our continued support of programs and services that enhance quality of life in communities across the province.

INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Members of the Legislative Assembly,
Province of Saskatchewan

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of Community Initiatives Fund, which comprise the statement of financial position at March 31, 2026, and the statements of operations, accumulated surplus and cash flows for the year ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Fund as at March 31, 2026, and the results of its operations, its changes in net financial assets (debt), and its cash flow for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. The annual report is expected to be made available to us after the date of this auditors' report.

Our opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and we do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Fund's financial reporting process.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. 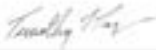

1. Nature of operations:

The Community Initiatives Fund (the "Fund"), previously known as the Associated Entities Fund, was established on August 23, 1996 by *The Saskatchewan Gaming Corporation Act* and is continued through *The Lotteries and Gaming Saskatchewan Corporation Act (2023)*. It is managed by a Board composed of not more than eight persons appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council. The Board is responsible for managing and operating the Fund.

Pursuant to *The Lotteries and Gaming Saskatchewan Corporation Act*, the Government of Saskatchewan receives, into the General Revenue Fund, certain gaming revenues. The Ministry of Parks, Culture and Sport transfers a portion of these gaming revenues to the Fund based on twenty-five percent of net revenues less a portion shared with the Clarence Campeau Development Fund through mutual agreement. The Board of the Fund grants these revenues to persons, organizations or associations in Saskatchewan for purposes prescribed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council upon application to and approval by the Board.

The Fund had an agreement with Sask Sport Inc. to provide administrative services to the Fund, which began April 1, 2023 and expired on March 31, 2026. In 2026 Sask Sport Inc. was paid \$200,000 (2025 - \$200,000). A new three-year agreement was signed on March 23, 2026 with Sask Sport Inc. to begin April 1, 2026 and expires on March 31, 2029. The fee for April 1, 2026-March 31, 2027 is \$70,000. (2028 - \$72,500, 2029 - \$75,000)

2. Significant accounting policies:

The Fund uses generally accepted accounting principles as recommended by the Public Sector Accounting Board of CPA Canada. The following accounting policies are considered significant.

Grant expense:

Grants are recognized when a completed grant application is received, all eligibility criteria are met by an eligible organization, and approval is obtained from the Board.

Grant returns:

Grant returns are recognized when a completed follow up report is received indicating funds were not fully utilized and approval is obtained from the Board.

Use of estimates:

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the Public Sector Accounting Standards requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Differences are reflected in current revenues and expenses when identified.

Revenue Recognition:

Transfers from the General Revenue Fund are recognized when received or receivable. Interest revenue is recognized when earned.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued):

Investments:

Fixed income investments are recorded at amortized cost.

Future Accounting policy changes:

Effective April 1, 2026, the following standards will be applied: *PSAB Conceptual Framework* and *PS 1202 Financial Statement Presentation*. These new standards will result in financial statement presentation changes. Effective April 1, 2029, *PS 3251 Employee Benefits* will be applied. This standard has not been assessed for impact on the future reported results of the Fund.

3. Designated Accumulated Surplus:

Pursuant to directions given under the governing legislation, the Board of the Fund has designated the accumulated surplus of \$6,451,221 (2025 - \$8,279,095) as follows:

- **Community Grants** to provide project grants to community initiatives that enhance human development;
- **Regional Exhibition Associations** to fund the activities of the associations in their communities;

The underlying assets consist of cash and investments. These designated net assets are not available for other purposes without the approval of the Board.

4. Accounts Payable:

Pursuant to an Order in Council, the Fund has recorded funds received from the Minister responsible for First Nations, Metis and Northern Affairs for the purpose of holding casino funds in trust until a Community Development Corporation is established for the Gold Horse Casino. The total amount received, pursuant to the Orders in Council, is \$8,014,747 (2025 - \$5,756,482) and is included in accounts payable. These funds will be paid to the Community Development Corporation when directed by government.

5. **Investments (continued):**

The fair market value of investments includes accrued interest which is recorded as a separate line on the statement of financial position.

6. **Financial risk management:**

Credit risk:

Credit risk is the risk that one party to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to discharge an obligation. The only receivable the Fund has at year end is interest receivable from Guaranteed Investment Certificates which are considered to be low risk.

Currency risk:

Currency risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in foreign exchange rates. The Fund is not exposed to any currency risk because it deals exclusively in Canadian currency.

Interest rate risk:

Interest rate risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market interest rates. The Fund does not borrow any funds and only invests in fixed income instruments with a guaranteed rate of return which carry minimal interest rate risk.

Liquidity risk:

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities. The Fund receives its funding from the Province of Saskatchewan prior to making grant commitments and maintains sufficient cash to meet current needs, therefore the exposure to liquidity risk is considered to be low.

Price risk:

Price risk is the risk that the fair value or future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. The Fund does not invest in any equity instruments and only purchases government guaranteed fixed income instruments or those issued by a major Canadian bank, so the price risk is considered to be low.

7. **Related party transactions:**

These financial statements include transactions with related parties. The Fund is related to all Saskatchewan Crown agencies such as ministries, corporations, boards and commissions under the common control of the Government of Saskatchewan. Also, the Fund is related to non-Crown enterprises that the Government jointly controls.

Related parties also include key management personnel which include Board members and the Executive Director of the Fund. All transactions with key management personnel were payments routinely paid in exchange for services rendered.

These related party transactions are in the normal course of operations and are recorded at the exchange amount which is the amount of consideration established and agreed to by the related parties. Other related party transactions and amounts due to/from are disclosed separately in these financial statements.

8. Budget:

The original budget was approved by the Board of Trustees on March 21, 2025.

9. Financial instruments:

The Fund, as part of its operations, carries a number of financial instruments which include cash, interest receivable, investments, accounts payable and grants payable. All financial instruments are carried at amortized cost which approximates their fair value due to their relative short-term maturities.

10. Statement of Remeasurement Gains and Losses:

A statement of remeasurement gains and losses has not been presented in these financial statements because all financial instruments are measured at amortized cost.

11. Lease and contract commitments:

The Fund is committed to an office lease and administrative service contract requiring minimum payments over the next five years as follows:

The Fund is also committed to paying actual general occupancy costs including property tax and operating expenses. These costs are not included in the lease and contract payment amounts noted above. These costs are anticipated to be approximately \$26,861 in 2027.
